May 13th -6th Sunday Of Pascha - The Blind Man- Teaching Liturgy Day!

(Commemorating the Holy Apostle James, Brother of St John The Theologian)

Today's Epistle Reading: EPISTLE: ACTS 16: 16-34 Today's Gospel Readings: LITURGY: John 9: 1-38

Troparion: "Christ is Risen from the dead, trampling down death by death, and upon those in the tombs, bestowing life!"

(The Troparion of the Blind Man & Tone also will be sung)

Spiritual Food: Thanks for being a part of this wonderful day, a day "That the Lord has made!" In order to help you better grasp the scope and the depth of our Lord's love FOR US, I thought it would be helpful to give you a 'map' to follow along as we make our journey into His Heavenly Kingdom (revealed on earth) by way of today's TEACHING Liturgy. At any point during our 'pauses', please feel free to ask a question, if you are not sure of something, ok? To begin, the word, "Liturgy" (litourgia in Greek) means 'common work or common action' - thus, the Divine Liturgy is not only the common work of the Orthodox Church, but the official action of the Church, formally gathered together as the 'chosen people of God'. We assemble in order to be together in one community to WORSHIP, to PRAY, to SING, to hear GOD'S WORD, to be INSTRUCTED in His Commandments, to OFFER OURSELVES with thanksgiving in Christ to God our Father, and to have the LIVING EXPERIENCE of God's eternal kingdom through COMMUNION with Christ Who is present in us by the Holy Spirit! Secondly, the Divine Liturgy as we know it today did not take its final form until the mid-9th Century, under the strong influence of Monastic Communities. Finally, there are many variations that we may encounter of the Liturgy when we go elsewhere to worship, but most of the differences that we may find are more cosmetic rather than theological: for example, in the Antiochian Church, they use a shortened form of the Prayer before Holy Communion, while in the Russian Church, they still say the Prayer of the Third Hour just before the Invoking of the Holy Spirit at the Anaphora. Overall, however, the Liturgy is the Liturgy in all places, at all times!

CELEBRATING MOTHER'S DAY

he past several decades have seen great changes in the status of women in our society. But we should begin by examining the impact that Christ made for women during the years of His life, and their continuing impact on His Church.



At the time of Our Lord, under Roman law, women were under perpetual guardianship; this means they had no legal authority over their own children, and husbands exercised authority of life and death over them. She was more of a piece of property than a living soul and child of God.

In many parts of the world, even today, the status of women is far from what it should be. But Christ gave women a place of dignity. He accepted women to be disciples, followers of His. Women were among Paul's helpers in spreading the Gospel. We think of the three Marys of the Scriptures: first, the Holy Virgin, the first among women, the mother of God; then Mary Magdalene, our Lords' devoted follower; and Mary, the mother of two great apostles, James and John.

Jesus took the time, even when hungry and thirsty, to talk to the woman of Samaria. Although of a despised race, Jesus spoke tenderly to her and taught her great spiritual truths. Think of the woman caught in adultery and condemned by the men of her time, but whom Jesus saved by reminding the men of their own sins. Think of the marvelous myrrh-bearing women who ministered to Jesus in life and death. It is thanks to the influence of Christ that women have reached their status of today, and it is through the influence of His teachings that this enlightenment will continue in the future.

A woman does not become a mother in the full sense simply because she biologically produces a child. It is the woman who loves and cherishes, who nourishes and sacrifices, that deserves the honor of Mother's Day. Let us on this day, pray for our mothers, be they with us or with our Lord.
