Spiritual Food:

Broken to Make Space for Him

It is not always bad to be "broken." Sometimes God has to break us a little in order to make space for Himself in our hearts to let the fragrance of His love pour into and out of us to others. Our hearts are like little fortified kingdoms where self, ego, rules. Until they are broken there is no room for anything but our own passions, ambitions, and desires.

Jesus cannot set up His kingdom in the central part of us — our hearts — until there is an opening, until our hearts are broken. The break is what makes it possible for Jesus to enter and displace the selfishness in our hearts with His love. This is perhaps why the shepherd of Hermas wrote in the early church, "God does not leave us until He has broken our hearts and our bones."

Broken through repentance to experience the beauty of God's peace. Broken in weakness to experience the power of God's strength. Broken through suffering to experience the sweetness of God's grace. Broken to be made more holy.

"BLESSED ARE YOU AMONG WOMEN . . ."

he role of the Holy Virgin Mary is clearly reflected in a temple of worship. Enter into a church, and what do you SEE? Inevitably, in a position of prominence, an icon of the Mother of God. It may be a huge portrayal that covers the wall area at the rear of the sanctuary. Certainly there will be an icon of the Birthgiver and Child Jesus at the one side of the Royal Doors.

The prominence of the Theotokos is also reflected in the calendar of the Church. There are a number of important feastdays honoring her, beginning with her Birth and ending with her Falling-Asleep in the Lord.

What do you HEAR upon entering a church? There are special commemorations of the Mother of God in the Divine Liturgy and other services. It is often that the faithful sing about the one who is "more bonorable than the Cherubim and beyond compare more glorious that the Seraphim . . ."

In public worship and in private prayer, in church and home, the Holy Virgin occupies a special place because of her relationship to Jesus Christ. This veneration of the mother serves to maintain the true belief concerning the identity of the Son. Jesus is God, therefore the mother who gave Him birth on this earth is Birthgiver of God. It was the Third Ecumenical Council, held in Ephesus in the year 431, which specified that the Holy Virgin is "Theotokos" – Mother of God.

Many of the finest and most ancient icons of our Faith are those that depict the Virgin and Child. There are hundreds of variations of these, but all reflect the relationship of the Mother to the Child as reason for veneration.
