### MARRIED TO THE LORD

he life of ST. EUPHROSYNE is both touching and tragic. She was born in Alexandria in the 5th century. Because of the prominence of her father Paphnutius, Euphrosyne grew up with everything she could possibly want. As she became a young woman, however, Euphrosyne realized that "only one thing was needful" for her: to serve Christ!

When Euphrosyne reached the age of 18, her father selected a husband for her. Wishing to give herself totally to the Lord, Euphrosyne disguised herself as a monk and sought refuge in a monastery. Her means of deception worked to perfection, as the abbot welcomed her into the monastic community. She remained there in virtual seclusion, spending every possible moment in prayer and meditation in her humble cell.

For years, Paphnutius continued to search tirelessly for his beloved daughter, who was now known as the monk Smaragdus. His efforts brought him to the very monastery that had become Euphrosyne's home. After explaining his plight to the abbot, Paphnutius was placed in the spiritual care of the monastery's most pious "monk": Smaragdus! After confessing his grief for his lost daughter, Paphnutius (who did not recognize Euphrosyne) was instructed to return in three days for an answer to his prayers. When he did so, Paphnutius found the "monk" near death. The final words of Smaragdus brought him comfort as well as sorrow: "I AM EUPHROSYNE, YOUR DAUGHTER." Grateful for having had the opportunity to see Euphrosyne one final time, Paphnutius decided to remain in the monastery, settling in the cell that had brought his daughter great spiritual fulfillment.
