
THE NATIVITY OF OUR LORD

St. Matthew in his Gospel tells something of the meaning of this name when he quotes Gabriel: "you shall call His name JESUS: for He shall save His people from their sins." The chosen name, Jesus, depicts exactly the chosen work of the Lord. Why did God become Man? Why did He leave the heights of heaven and dwell in the depths of earth? Why did the Creator take upon Himself the frailties of the creature?

He did it to save mankind, to do something for people that they could not do for themselves. He came to save.

St. Paul takes up this wonderful theme of the name and work of the Saviour when he writes in his Epistle to the Philippians: ". . . Christ Jesus, who, though He was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied

Himself, taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. And being found in human form He humbled Himself and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross. Therefore God has highly exalted Him and bestowed on Him

the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory

of God the Father."

As for the word "Christ," which has come to be used as a proper name for our Lord, it really is His title. This is the name that identifies Him. The word means "The Anointed One." It refers to the Messiahship. Christmas is the celebration of the birth of our Saviour. Let Him enter our hearts and truly make this day a holy and joyous one.

God Again Blesses Us With The Relics Of His Saints!



St. Sophia Of Kiev

The Holy Abbess Sophia (Grineva) was born in Moscow in 1873. Living close to the Optina Monastery, she always visited there, and was told by several of the nuns there that she too would become an Abbess. Gifted with a wonderful voice, Sophia, she studied at the Kiev Conservatory, where her professors promised her a glittering future in music.

Just before graduating at age 22, she fell severely ill and lost her voice; in despair, she asked for, and received her share of here father's inheritance, and, along with ten other young women, founded a community dedicated to the Holy Trinity in a remote and deserted wooded area. She was guided by several Holy men: St. John of Kronstadt, Elder Ambrose of Optina, and the Elder Barnabas Of Gethsamene skete.

As her health worsened, she left the convent and was given over to spiritism (the belief that departed souls regularly interact with the living) but finally, near death, was given Holy Unction and miraculously recovered! She later founded the Spiritual Community "Joy and Consolation" near the St. John the Almsgiver Church, as well as the Protection Convent near Kiev.

Her fame grew in the realm of the Church, until the Russian Communists arrested her and sent her from one Prison to another, and she finally reposed in the Lord on April 4th 1941.




St. Prince Lazar Of Serbia

Born in 1329, Lazar Hrebeljanovic was a famed medieval Serbian ruler who created the largest and most powerful state on the territory after the death of first, Emperor Dushan, and then Emperor Uros V.

Tsar Lazar was able to petition the Patriarch Of Constantinople to heal the schism between the two Churches (1352) and full communion was re-established in 1375. Prince Lazar also restored the monasteries of Hilandar on Mt. Athos and Gornjak, and built the Ravanica and Lazarica monasteries. He also was a great benefactor of the St. Pantelemon monastery on Mt. Athos.

He was married to Tsaritca Milica, and they had seven children: Mara, St. Stefan Visoki, Prince Vuk, Dragana, Teodora, Jelena, and Olivera.

St. Lazar is best known for his long-standing battle with the Turkish powers, culminating with the famed Battle of Kosovo on June 28th, 1389 on the Field of Blackbirds (Kosovo Polje). Serbian tradition has it that he was visited by an Angel of God on the eve of the battle and was given a choice: win the battle and have an earthly kingdom, or lose the battle and gain the Heavenly Kingdom. He opted for The latter, and died in the Battle, and was beheaded. His relics lie in the Monastery Ravenica in Central Serbia.



St. Jonah Of Odessa

St. Jonah (Atamansky), Hieroconfessor of Odessa, was born in Odessa in September of 1852. His parents died when he was very young, and he spent many months at the cemetery where his parents were buried. Later, he began wandering the streets, feeding off the the contents of refuse thrown away, and sleeping at night on the garbage dumps outside the city.

Finally, both his former nanny and his uncle had pity on him, giving him shelter and sending him to school, where he was noticed for his good qualities and gifted voice. As he grew, he matured into a God-fearing and religious man, and in 1884, he was ordained a Deacon; in 1886, a Priest. Fr. Jonah served parishes: in Kardashovka, and later, the Odessa Dormition Cathedral, and finally the maritime port Church of St. Nicholas.

Greatly loved by his faithful flocks, he always kept his home open to all people: he Knew people well, could read their thoughts and penetrate into their souls, finding good In people that no one else saw. Thousands of people were cured of physical and spiritual Infirmities through his constant prayers. He built a hostel near his St. Nicholas Church Where many vagrants, travelers and demon-possessed people whom he cured found refuge. He was considered the "2nd John of Kronstadt" – and it was often reported that many Demon-possessed people would shriek and cry as they were brought to him at the Holy Chalice, but after he communed them, they would return quiet and normal!

St. Jonah died after a long and painful illness on May 30th, 1924, and was buried near the St. Nicholas Church – many miracles have taken place in his name throughout the land!
